It should perhaps be noted that the prestigious College of Arms celebrated their quincentenary last year dating from the founding by King Richard III in 1484. The officers of the College are members of the Royal Household being the Sovereign's representative in all matters heraldic and genealogical.

Finally, a note about our masthead. The design depicts the Haskell arms as found in Burke's GENERAL ARMOURY, "Vaire ar and sa. Crest: On a mount an apple tree fructed proper." The use of this device as an illustration in no way implies any entitlement to bear these arms as a right, and no such entitlement is claimed. The subject of arms will be covered in a future issue.

TRIBUTE IN RECOGNITION AND IN MEMORIAM

In this, the issue marking the rebirth of the HASKELL JOURNAL, we wish to take the opportunity to recognize Burnette Gregor Haskell (1857-1907) As the founder of the American Haskell Family Assn. and the HASKELL JOURNAL in 1898, his career is worthy of far more than a passing glance.

Burnette G. Haskell was born 13 June 1857, in Sierra County, California and died 16 November 1907 in San Francisco. He was The scion of the Rochester, Mass. family of Deacon Roger Haskell (Burnette Wilder Jr. , Edw. Wilder, Frince, Nathaniel⁵, Mark⁴, Deacon Roger³, Mark², Roger¹.

(cf. Chronicles of the Haskell Family, pp.32-5, and pp.90-120). Rochester family produced many eminent persons, among them, Ira J Haskell author of the cited text, and was responsible for establishing the original family association in 1911. Others in this distinguished family will be covered in detail in future issues.

Edward Wilder Haskell Jr., Burnette's father, was a school teacher who went to California in the 1849 Gold Rush, appearing in the 1850 Census, aged 31, located in Yuba County. Legendary Haskell reputedly the source of the Mother Lode in adjoining Sierra County is named for him. Whether he was successful as a miner is not clear but he was later a successful rancher in southern California having acquired property involving oil interests, Rancho Santa Paula y Santocoy, property in the vicinity of San Francisco. He married about 1856, Marie Antoinnette Briggs (d.1903) and they had the following children:

Burnett Gregor Haskell (1857-1907) m. Anna Hayden Feder

Helen Montmorenci Haskell(1860-1942) m Stephen S. Thomas,an artist. Edward Prince Haskell (1865-?)

Benjamin Briggs Haskell (1867-1902)

Burnette attended California schools, The University of California, read law and was admitted to the bar in the state in 1879. He became a curious mixture of lawyer-socialist, labor leader, writer, politician, orator, genealogist, romancer, economist, civic leader and eccentric but above all an idealist and never dull.

He was, perhaps, first and foremost a leader of social reform and early became a supporter of the International Workingmens Assoc., a labor movement with a secret membership, and editor of its journal TRUTH whose motto was "TRUTH is five cents a copy and dynamite forty cents a ".bounda

For many years Burnette appeared on San Francisco's Grant Ave. Sunday mornings in the vicinity of his law office at Market St. or on the steps of the nearby branch U.S. Mint at Fifth and Mission Sts. harangue his adherents or anyone else who would listen. Chief of Police Patrick Crowley had Haskell arrested several times as a disturber of the peace, but being an astute attorney, Haskell always managed to have his case dismissed and continued his work as a social evangelist.

He was described in a San Francisco newspaper article of medium height and always dressing neatly with "..nothing in particular about his appearance to attract the attention of the observer, save his large blue eyes, which stand prominently forward. His enunciation is clear and distinct, his language well chosen, sentences well rounded and at times guilded with eloquence."

Taking his idea from Edward Bellamy's "Looking Backward", Burnette and about 100 others founded a cooperative colony at Topolobampo. State, Mexico on the Gulf of California. As with most utopian endeavors, the colony failed after about a year and a half. Haskell was repudiated by his followers who had to work their passage home on ships.

He consistently neglected a lucrative law practice specializing in probate, land and admiralty located at 1346 Market St. in San Francisco. to toil in the thankless vinyards of labor and social reform. writer, during many years at sea, was well aware of the sweeping reforms brought about by Andrew Furuseth, a Norwegian seaman turned labor reformer on the West Coast and his crusading seamans union. responsible for the most significant improvements in sailor's working conditions. Accounts indicate that ship's crews experienced by far worst conditions of all workers, making their unionization in a a major port like San Francisco an absolute necessity in eliminating the worst abuses. What was not known was that in 1881 Frank Roney emerged with Furuseth as one of the principle radical reformers, became president of the San Francisco Trade Assembly, and in 1891, a major organizer of the Coast's Seaman's Union. Burnette G. Haskell shared an equally important far less publicized role in these drastic labor reform movements.

With the encouragement and support of several prominent businessmen of San Francisco, Haskell began publication of THE HASKELL JOURNAL. Monthly Magazine" in January, 1898. This was, as Ira J. Haskell stated "..a truly unique attempt in the field of genealogy and far in advance of its time." Regrettably, the publication failed after only four issues due in large part to insufficient financial support.

Meanwhile, Haskell had been active in numerous other projects and became co-founder of the Kaweah Cooperative Commonwealth, located partly in what is now Sequoia National Park, California. With fellow labor leader James J. Martin, he headed a group filing claims on timber land near Visalia in 1885. Their intent was to establish a colony based on Laurence Gronlund's Cooperative Commonwealth. Kaweah's idealistic "deed of settlement" stated its aims as "To improve the health, secure the happiness and perfect the wellbeing of each and every member. to propagate and extend in the world at large, the idea of universal and just cooperation."


The colony, located in eastern Tulare County on the banks of the haweah River, attracted about 400 people during its lifetime(1885-1892). An eighteen mile long access road was begun 8 October 1986. Nearly four years later, in June, 1890, the road was completed. The road, which can still be travelled today, reaches an elevation of 8000 feet. Haskell's role in the colony is perpetuated in the prominent land | feature | as Haskell's Bluff.

The greatest material asset the colony had was its timber holdings which proved to be the point of dispute over which the commune failed. The U.S. Government, anxious to crush what they perceived as a "menace", and to protect the huge private California timber interests, evicted the colonists in the name of "preservation" in September, 1890. However, there was far less concern with land preservation than with the destruction of a social experiment. Ironically, the site at Kaweah is commemorated by a plaque officially recognizing the utopian scheme by the Federal Government.

The San Francisco newspapers of the time had a field day. CHRONICAL was opposed to the colony while the TIMES stated sympathetically (11Nov1891)"..the whole machinery of the government was being in motion to starve out a body of industrious, inoffensive intelligent people."

"The end came in January , 1892, when the trustees were indicted for using the mails to defraud by sending out colony literature and soliciting donations. On 18 January 1892, Haskell was arrested and had to plead "abject poverty" to his \$3000 bail; he was finally released after the bail was reduced to \$500. When the case came to trial, the jury promptly acquitted him on the grounds of insufficient evidence.

Haskell had written, "We meant to create amid the hills an ideal commonwealth, the Fraternal Republic of which the world will always dream." In an article published in OUT WEST in 1902, he wrote, "We were not fit to survive and we died. But there was no bribe money in our pockets; and beaten and as ragged as we are, we are not ashamed.. And is there no remedy, then, for the evils that oppress the poor? And is there no surety that the day is coming when justice and right shall reign the earth? I do not know; but I believe and I hope, and I trust. "Haskell died on 16 November 1907, poor and friendless.



Clarissa Harlowe Barton (1821-1912), known historically as "Clara Barton" founder of the American Red Cross and called "Angel of the Battlefield" began her work on the battlefields of the American Civil War at the Second Battle of Bull Run in August, 1862. Enroute to Washington Armory Square Hospital while taking supplies to convalescents, she learned of the terrible slaughter and knowing that she would be needed, wrote hastily ".. I leave immediately for the battlefield...."

With the help of her assistants, Mrs. Ada Morrell and Miss Lydia F. Haskell, an old friend from New Jersey, she loaded emergency relief and medical supplies into a railway boxcar and arrived at Fairfax Station, Virginia next day. How she persuaded the military authorities to let her go to the front with the army in full retreat is a mystery, but she made her appearance at Fairfax along with her two assistants, perched on the pile of crates of her emergency supplies to succor the wounded and maimed. Miss Lydia Haskell of New Jersey has not been further identified.

^{**} The last entry, Henry W. Haskell, was born in Wilton, NH in 1816 and was employed as an assistant teacher before his trip west. Henry, along with his fellow members of the "Salem Mechanics and Trading and Mining Association" embarked on the ship CRESCENT on 6 December 1849 in Salem, Ma. and arrived in California 26 May 1850 to begin their new careers.

THE PERILS OF GENAELOGICAL RESEARCH excerpt from The Haskell Journal Vol. I No. 2 February, 1898

Among the hundreds of letters that I have received have been quite a number asking the editor personally for his own genealogy. His modesty has prevented him thus far from giving at. But since the Haskell Journal is not published for profit, and since every Haskell in the United States is presumed to be upon the editorial staff, and their assistance is demanded in solving the various problems connected with the Haskell history, I have made up my mind to yield to the request noted above and to state something concerning my own origin.

I married a widow who had a stepdaughter. My father married the stepdaughter. That made my wife the motherin-law of her father in law and made my stepdaughter my stepmother, and thus my father became my stepson. Then my stepmother, stepdaughter of my wife, had a son; the boy was, of course, my brother because he was my father's son. But he was also the son of my wife's stepdaughter and therefore her grandson. And that made me the grandfather of my stepbrother. Then my wife had a son, his name is Astaroth; thus my mother-in-law, the stepsister of my son is also his grandmother because he is her stepson's child My father-in-law is the brother-in-law of my child because his stepsister is his wife. I am therefore the brother of my own son who is also the child of my step-grandmother. I am my mother's brother-in-law, her name is Maria Briggs Haskell and she is still living after this. My wife is her own child's aunt and I always thought there was something weak in her mental makeup or she would never have married me. But the most peculiar matter of this whole affair is this, that while my son is my father's nephew, I am certainly, absolutely, and conclusively my own grandfather. this can be demonstrated by all the rules of logic. Of course there is not a word of truth in all this thing but it proves that Shoel itself has no terror like those inflicted upon the editor in the attempt to connect the missing links in the Haskell family, without further information, and it enforces the lesson that every one of you people ought to be particular in filling out your blanks so as not to mix up the relations too much.

A mixup is bad for the community.

I trust that this will satisfy those people who want to know where I came from, and especially that it will make you all careful concerning your dates and names, and induce you all to send \$2 so you may know where you are at hereafter.

CAPTAIN HENRY HASKELL **PRIVATEER**

In 1803, two years before Trafalgar and twelve years before Waterloo and Napolean's final downfall, England was engaged in mortal combat with France. The British fleet roamed far and wide protecting England's overseas possessions and a tight blockade was imposed on French ports. However, while the war at sea went well, British land forces were in a weakened condition. Seizing the opportunity, Napolean began planning an invasion.

On BJune 1803, Captain Henry Haskell Master of the Portsmouth vessel Trimmer personally appeared before the Right Honorable the Lord Commissioner of the British Admiralty and applied for letters of Marque and Reprisal "...for apprehending, seizing and taking the Ships, Vessels and Goods belonging to the French Republic, or to any Persons being Subjects of the French Republic.."

The <u>Trimmer</u> was described as "35 tons burthen, British built, with one mast, mounting 4 four pounder carriage guns and 8 swivel guns, manned by twenty men, armed with twenty small arms, twenty cutlasses, ten barrels of powder, thirty rounds of great shot and about 100 weight of small shot." She was " victualled for three months, equipped two suits of sails and three anchors, three cables and about 200 weight of spare cordage." Principle crew members were listed as John Chiswick, Lieutenant; Wm. Nice, Gunner; John Jones, Boatswain; Wm. Procter, Carpenter; Edward James, Cook; and John Thompson, Surgeon. Captain Haskell was listed as "..sole Owner and Setter-out of the said ship." (HCA 26/88).

On 22 June, these intrepid adventturers captured the French brig <u>La Flore</u> westward of the Scilly Islands and took > their prize into Plymouth, Devon.

According to the depositions of the French Master, Captain Marie Francois Henri Fils, the <u>Trimmer</u> audaciously seized the French vessel virtually under the mose of patrolling HMS Hussar under the command of Capt. Wilkinson of the Royal Navy. As the Hussar was to leeward, she was unable to effect the capture and did not reach the other two vessels until about 11AM of the following day. The Master of the French vessel "..being dissatisfied with the conduct of the privateer captors.." asked for and received permission to return to port on the HMS Hussar.

At the time of her capture, Flore was on a voyage from Saint Domingo to Havre de Grace with a complement of 25 persons consisting of her crew, five survivors of a shipwreck, and six passengers, all French citizens. The cargo consisted of sugar, coffee, cotton, indigo, dye wood, lignum vitae, mahogany logs, hides and 12 hogsheads of rum.

The minutes of the prize court show the case opened on 18 July 1803, stating the <u>Irimmer</u> of Portsmouth, Henry Haskell, Master, had taken as a prize the French vessel <u>La Flore</u> and brought

her into Plymouth. On 4 October 1803 an interim decree for condemnation made. (HCA 29/2). The following minute book (HCA 29/2) shows a claim had been placed for HMS Hussar as a "joint captor. "The case was still in progress on 19 December 1803, and apparently continued for some six years. In the end, little Trimmer had to share her prize in a decree which stated the two vessels were " joint captors" after all presumably because the <u>Hussar</u> sighted and was sighted from the La Flore before being boarded by the Trimmer.

Captain Henry Haskell is believed have been a brother of Captain Richard Haskell, Master of the trading vessel <u>Duke of Portland</u> of Fortsea-Portsmouth who married first Charity Alford of Portsmouth at Alverstoke on 30 June 1793 and secondly Sophia Hall at Fortsea on 20 September 1805.

The Haskell family of Portsea-Portsmouth arrived in this seacoast area around 1690 and seems to have been the main seafaring branch of the family in England. Many more noted mariners can trace their roots to this branch of the family.
